

The big picture In preparation for the programmes of study to follow in key stage 1, children will learn vocabulary related to the passing of time. They begin to develop an understanding of past, present and future. This will be done by developing their sense of change over time (eg how they have changed since they were a baby) However, also through stories and the study of significant events and people they will begin to understand how we find out about the past and how the world was different. They begin to recognise the difference between past and present.
